


DB 97385 Traveling with service animals: by air, road, rail, and ship across North America by Henry Kisor

animal policies on planes, trains, cruise ships, and more. 2019.


DB 94572 Mutual rescue: how adopting a homeless animal can save you, too by Carol Novello

Includes individual stories of the physical and mental benefits of pet adoption, with supporting statistics and scientific studies. Commercial audiobook. 2019.




DB 74197 Dog heroes: a nonfiction companion to Magic Tree House #46 by Mary Pope Osborne




